Councilor's Corner by Second Ward Councilman Charlie Holder

Well, we are in the heart of the Summer in Newport. Even though we find ourselves dealing with the elements of the season, both good & bad, City business still rolls on. There are some great opportunities for the residents to get involved in the coming months. The people of Newport will have opportunities to voice their opinions in the hopes of steering us into the direction we find best.

The Coggeshall School development came in front of the council and the team from BCM Realty was chosen as the bidder for the project. This is the same group who transformed the Cranston Calvert School into market-rate apartments. This decision was met with some resistance, but what people need to understand is that this decision only gives the developer the chance to negotiate with the city on the project. In no way is this project even close to getting started. There will be several public meetings where folks can voice their ideas on what they would like to see happen. The developer will also have to go before the Planning and Zoning Boards for approval. We are looking at an 18-24-month process before anything can start happening.

A major situation developing is the current building of the new Rogers High School. Due to differing circumstances the project is facing massive over-budgeting problems to the tune of approximately \$30+ million dollars over the original price tag of \$98.5 million. This does not even take into consideration the \$15 million bond that was approved last year.

My concern is how reasonable will the taxpayers of Newport be to yet another proposed bond on a high school project that seems to be becoming a financial disaster? We know without question the need is there for a new school, but at what expense? We are trying to find the answers and the best way possible to solve this issue.

Lastly, my appreciation goes out to everyone who is dealing with the seemingly constant road construction. Seems like every street you turn on there is work being done. Though it is frustrating to deal with now, in the end, it will greatly improve Newport's infrastructure. So please continue to be patience and understanding!

Gardening on Top the Hill by Claire O'Donnelly

Well, it looks like summer is finally here! What an unusual and disappointing spring we had. A warm spell followed by frost caused havoc with many spring budding flowers such as the Hydrangeas. Blooms have been in short supply this year, so if you had flowers consider yourself very fortunate indeed. On the other hand, the lilies have been spectacular. I guess mother nature is not completely cruel.

I planted Calla Lillies and Begonias last year which I overwintered in my basement. They survived beautifully and I planted them out in June. They have grown well producing a spectacular display of foliage! Not a single flower! So, what have I learned from this?

There are two options for planting Calla Lillies in the spring. Either plant the tubers in a pot first and let them grow indoors, or plant them directly outdoors when frost is no longer expected. If the tubers are planted in pots first, start them off in March. This way you'll give the plants an advantage and they'll begin to bloom earlier in the year. If not wait till the middle to end of May when the danger of frost has passed. That's where I went wrong, I planted too late! If you wait too long to plant, they will not reward you with flowers. I check on them daily with fingers crossed and breath baited but, in my heart, I know the flowers are not coming. Ah well, maybe next year!

By this time of the summer, I would normally be busy tending to my edible garden and my annuals; however life and rabbits have turned me down a different path, for this year only, I hope!

First the rabbits! Have you noticed that Newport is overrun with the little critters this year? Everywhere I look I see them. In my own garden, in the garden of neighbors, and darting across the streets in the neighborhood. They are very bold and seem to have no fear of humans at all. The ones in my garden allow me to be almost within picking-up distance before they scamper off to the safety of the trees or my neighbors' gardens. Consequently, they have feasted on my annuals! Every petunia that I planted has been eaten into the ground. In desperation I planted some New Guinea Impatiens which they do not seem to care for. Unfortunately, these don't love my intense afternoon sun and so I find myself having to be more vigilant about my watering than I would have liked to be. So, what can be done without turning into Elmer Fudd?

- 1. Deer and Rabbit repellants can be helpful, but these do wash off after heavy rain and this year my rabbits didn't seem particularly repelled!
- 2. Sometimes you must get creative to save your vegetables from critters. Try using chicken wire over the top of a raised bed to deter a pesky bunny from munching. You can also wrap the base of beans and other climbers for the same reason.

As for my edible garden (edible for people, not just bunnies!), I was traveling this spring and early summer and there just never seemed to be a correct time to plant. So, I guess I am letting my raised boxes go to fallow which is not actually such a bad thing as the crops grown in these boxes should really be rotated every year. For those of you who did get to plant this year watering has not been much of an issue. However, with this warm turn in the weather you may need to be more vigilant about watering. For those of us with no fresh tomatoes, peppers, or herbs, I highly recommend the farmers market on Wednesdays on Memorial Drive.

Answers:

- 1. Mr. Potato Head.
- 2. Common Blue Violet. Voted as the state flower by school children in 1897. It wasn't until March 1968 that the violet was officially adopted as the state flower. Rhode Island was the last state to adopt an official state flower.
- 3. Red Maple. Voted as the state tree by school children in the 1890's. But it wasn't officially adopted as the state tree until 1964.
- 4. Coffee Milk: Similar to chocolate milk but is made with coffee syrup. Coffee milk became so popular in Rhode Island that in 1993 the Rhode Island state legislature voted coffee milk as the official state drink. Autocrat Coffee Syrup of Rhode Island is a leading provider of premium coffee, syrup, and coffee extract since 1895.

- 6. The anchor
